PRESENTATIONS AND PROCLAMATIONS

Business of the Year - Revo Bicycles and Espresso Bar

Management Analyst Kelly provided a PowerPoint presentation. She stated that Revo has been open in Dana Point for the past six (6) years and that on July 28, 2007 they moved into their new building across the street. Revo employs five (5) full-time and three (3) part-time people. The espresso bar serves traditional drinks such as espresso, coffee, and hot chocolate as well as specialty drinks geared for cyclists and other athletes. Revo carries everything from beach cruisers to high-end bicycles. They host weekly bike rides and are a major sponsor of the Dana Point Grand Prix. Mayor Bishop presented a Certificate of Recognition to Darrin Duhamel for being named the Business of the Year for 2007.

Introduction of Nichole Chambers, Dana Point Chamber of Commerce

Mayor Bishop introduced Ms. Chambers and asked her to provide a summary of her plans for the Chamber of Commerce.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Ed Guy, San Juan Capistrano, thanked the City for allowing the Dana Point Lighthouse Society the opportunity to display their lighthouses in the Council Chamber foyer. He encouraged everyone to join the society.

Judy Rice, Laguna Hills/Hemet, spoke regarding the City of Huntington Beach and their agreement with Makar in regards to senior center funding.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

There were no Public Hearings.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

There were no Unfinished Business items.

NEW BUSINESS

Mayor Bishop recused himself from Item 20 due to a possible conflict of interest and left the Council Chambers at 6:23 p.m.

20. PRESENTATION BY TRANSPORTATION CORRIDOR AGENCY (0150-83)

David Lowe, Acting Chief Engineer for the Transportation Corridor Agency (TCA) provided a presentation which detailed the issues the TCA is currently trying to resolve with the alignment of the SR241. He stated that for more information on the project to go to www.relievetraffic.org. The presentation is attached as Exhibit 1.

Council Member Harkey asked if the \$100 M that the TCA was offering to California State Parks could be used any way the State Parks would like to.

David Lowe replied that the TCA acknowledges that there will be some impacts to the State Park campground so this money is meant to help enhance the State Park however they decide.

Council Member Harkey stated that this money would be a benefit to the State Park. She felt that the 14,000 new homes that have been approved in Mission Viejo will create more traffic than the I-5 will be able to handle and the toll road extension should relieve the traffic burden from the city streets.

Council Member Anderson asked where the \$100 M was coming from to offer to the State Parks.

David Lowe replied that the duration of the bond indebtedness will have to be increased.

Mayor Pro Tem Bartlett felt that with the 14,000 homes that are to be built in the Rancho Mission Viejo area that Antonio Parkway and Ortega Highway would not be able to handle the traffic and that the toll road extension would be necessary. She stated that the extension is also necessary from an emergency evacuation standpoint as the extension would have a huge, positive effect in the area.

Mayor Bishop returned to the Council Chambers at 6:41 p.m.

21. REORGANIZATION - CITY CLERK'S OFFICE

City Manager Chotkevys provided a staff report.

Mayor Bishop stated that he had asked for this item to be brought forward after review of the City's organizational structure. He felt that with the City Clerk reporting to the City Council that it made the position more political and vulnerable. He added that it would make more sense for the position to report to the City Manager.

Council Member Anderson stated that she concurred with the Mayor. She stated that she felt uncomfortable having the City Clerk report to the City Council since the City Clerk administers the elections when the Clerk technically work for the elected officials. She added that she would support the change.

Council Member Weinberg stated that he wanted to keep the City Clerk position from being a revolving door and that he supports the change. He added that the City Clerk does administer the elections and that puts the City Clerk in the middle. He felt that it would be better to let the City Manager hire and manage the staff.

Council Member Harkey acknowledged that the position of City Clerk had been a problem position in the past due to politics or the elected officials, not due to structure of chain of command. She stated that wholesale changes should cure a disease, not treat a symptom. She stated that the other beach cities have an elected or appointed City Clerk. She asserted that the City Clerk is not a clerical function but a political function, administering elections, reporting, and other technical and legal duties. She stated that the previous problems were due to previous Councils. The Clerk and the selection process was a huge issue in 2004 as there was not an open and transparent hiring process. She did not feel that this Council had a problem with hiring City Clerks.

She stated that Kathy Ward is the best City Clerk we have ever had and the Council chose her unanimously. The City Manager recommended her knowing she would be independent, she accepted the position knowing she would be independent, Council negotiated an employment contract, salary, benefits, etc. assuming she would be independent, and she has performed in an exemplary fashion under fire.

She also stated that under the current organization there was a separation of powers, as the City Clerk can obtain advice directly from an independent City Attorney and it created more transparency in government. If changed, we are placing the City Manager in charge of the Clerk and hence of elections and reporting. The City Manager is the City Treasurer and now also the City Clerk. Change in City Clerk contract could provide less security to the position and undue pressure on the City Manager.

She suggested that if we really wanted to make a structural change we should consider an elected and stronger Mayor position. That way the Mayor would have a mandate from the people to implement changes.

Mayor Pro Tem Bartlett stated that in her review of the duties and responsibilities of the City Clerk that it was her opinion that there should be a certain level of independence and separation between the positions of the City Clerk and the City Manager. She added that she would want to keep the current appointment and evaluation arrangement as it is and does not support a change.

Council Member Weinberg stated that the Council is similar to a board of directors and that they do not know if their City Clerk is at work as she should be. The day-to-day operations should be left up to the City Manager.

Mayor Bishop stated that since there has been a constant turnover of City Clerks in the past he felt that the change would offer the position some protection from a rogue Council and put the position in line with the other executive management in the City.








Balancing

- SR-73 in Orange County








Environmentally Sensitive Habitat Areas (ESHA)




- Recent state proposed budget cuts may force cutbacks at San Onofre and San Clemente State Beaches
- TCA has offered \$100 million to do such things
- Extend the lease for the State Beach which expires in 2021
- Add campsites to San Onofre SB & San Clemente SB
- Restore cottages, coastal sage scrub habitat and construct camping facilities at nearby Crystal Cove State Park ı

San Onofre State Beach



- State park is a lease hold from Camp Pendleton (expires in 2021)
- Marines requested that route be as close to the northern edge of Camp Pendleton as possible
- Toll Road is inland of I-5
- It does not impact coastal units of the park
- 95% of the visitors use the coastal units



No Impacts to Trestles Surf Break



- demonstrated that the surf break at Trestles would Coastal staff claims that TCA has not adequately be protected.
- The cobble source for the foundational material for the surf break will not be changed.
- Fine sediment flow in the watershed, while not critical to the surf break, is nevertheless maintained.
- significant retrofit of I-5, which currently drains directly Water quality in the coastal zone will be improved with to San Mateo and San Onofre Creeks.
- 500 supports within the area have not impacted the break.
- Embankments constructed across the San Mateo area (railroad, Old Highway 101 & I-5) have not impacted the break.
